Regulations & Syllabus Bachelor of Arts (BA) in English and Communication

Duration: Minimum Three (3) Years and Maximum Eight (8) Years

Eligibility: Stream 1: 10 + 2 or equivalent Stream 2: Minimum Age 18 + Bachelor's

Preparatory Programme (of TNOU or any other Open University) Fee: 1700 (1200 + 500) Medium of Instruction: English

Scheme of Evaluation: 3-hour final examination carrying 75% of the total weight and continuous assessment carrying 25% of the total weight. To complete each Course, the learner is required to secure minimum 35% of the 75% in the final examination and overall 40% in both final and continuous assessment taken together. Those students who secure 60% and above in aggregate will be placed in the First Class; those who secure 50% and above but below 60% in aggregate will be placed in the Second Class and those who secure 40% and above but below 50% in aggregate will be placed in the Third/Pass Class. The examination question pattern is as follows:

For the Foundation Course in English¹:

• Annotation (to attempt 2 out of 3 questions) 2x4 marks = 08 marks

Short essay of 200 words (to attempt 2 out of 5)
 2x10 marks = 20 marks

• Reading comprehension 1x12 marks = 12 marks

• Grammar (Tenses, articles, etc.) 10x2 marks = 20 marks

• Précis writing 1x15 marks = 15 marks

For BEGC 34 (Phonetics and Spoken English):

- Short factual answer. Explain any 5 of the 7 in about 50 words each (5 x 5 marks = 25 marks) 25 marks
- Phonetic Transcription of 10 words out of 15 (10 x 2 marks = 20 marks) 20 marks
- Transcription of 2 of 3 dialogues between 2 persons based on a situation
- (e.g., Ticket booking, accident, etc) (2 x 15 marks = 30 marks) 30 marks

For all other Courses:

Explain any three of the following in about 50 words - Annotation/Short answer
 - 3 x 5 = 15 marks

- Answer any 3 in about 150 words Short essay 3 x 10 = 30 marks
- Answer any 2 in about 200 words Long essay 2 x 15 = 30 words

¹ All students of Bachelor's Degree Programmes (excepting B.Lit and BCA) of TNOU must undergo a Foundation Course in Tamil (or any one of the following: French, Hindi, Kannada, Malayalam, Telugu, Urdu) and English. During the 1st year, BA/B.Com./BBA/B.Sc./BTS students have a 6-credit Foundation Course and during the 2nd year, only BA/B.Sc. students have a 6-credit Foundation Course.
